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Public meeting set on plans to save endangered fish species Big turnout of Northwest citizens expected

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SPOKANE, Wash. – The first ocean-to-headwater analysis of actions to save endangered salmon, steelhead and resident fish in the Columbia River will get a public airing in Spokane on Tuesday, Feb. 8. This draft analysis, known as the All-H Paper, addresses factors that affect imperiled species: hatcheries, harvest, hydropower and habitat.

The Spokane meeting will be held in the Grand Ballroom of the Double Tree Hotel, 32 N. Spokane Falls Court, with signup for public comment at noon and an overview presentation at 1 p.m., to be followed by questions and answers and a comment period. The agenda is repeated at 6:30 p.m. The Spokane event is the second in a series of 13 public meetings scheduled in the four Northwest states and Alaska in February and March. A schedule is attached.

"The All-H Paper contains alternatives that the region can follow in implementing a plan to save weak stocks of fish," said Will Stelle, regional director of the National Marine Fisheries Service. "For the first time, federal agencies responsible for directing the recovery will have a unified plan. Because it will touch the lives of everyone in the region, we are seeking the advice of Northwest residents."

A draft Environmental Impact Statement on the lower Snake River and a report on drawdown at John Day Dam, both authored by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, will also be

on the meeting agenda. The lower Snake River draft EIS focuses on options for improving salmon passage on the lower Snake River. The John Day Drawdown report evaluates drawdown of John Day, and discusses whether or not drawdown merits further study, because of potential benefits to fish recovery. That report includes a preliminary recommendation for no further study of drawdowns at John Day.

"The federal agencies recognize the urgency and importance of recovering salmon and steelhead," said Brig. Gen. Carl A. Strock, commander of the Corps' Northwestern Division. "We want citizens of the entire region involved to understand the actions being proposed and participate in identifying the tradeoffs that will have to take place to reach recovery."

The All-H Paper analyzes and proposes alternative approaches to improving habitat, harvest and the operations of dams and hatcheries. When it becomes final later this year, it will guide the actions of the National Marine Fisheries Service, the Environmental Protection Agency, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Bureau of Reclamation, the Bureau of Land Management, the U.S. Forest Service, the Army Corps of Engineers, the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Bonneville Power Administration.

The four alternatives defined in the All-H Paper are:

1. Removal of the four lower Snake River dams (one of the options in the Corps' Lower Snake EIS) with little increased effort in other areas;
2. Harvest constraints along with existing hydro and habitat efforts;
3. Aggressive actions in all Hs without breaching the four lower Snake River dams;
4. Maximum protections in all Hs, including dam breaching.

The plan that emerges later this year will be one of the largest environmental improvement efforts in the world, costing Northwest electricity ratepayers more than \$400 million a year. Additional funding will come through the congressional appropriations process.

The format of the meetings will allow ample opportunity for public comment, with afternoon and evening sessions scheduled in Spokane and many other locations. The meetings will follow an open-house format, with informative exhibits on each of the Hs and the alternatives contained in the All-H Paper and the Corps' draft EIS. Many experts will be on hand to answer questions and explain documents.

Oral comments will be recorded at the meeting. Written comments will be received at the meeting or by mail. The comment period on the All-H paper closes March 17. The comment period for the Corps' draft EIS closes on March 31. The following is the schedule for the Spokane meeting at the Double Tree Hotel:
