SEQUIM, Wash. – What would the White House want with 11-year-old Greywolf Elementary School student Christine Signes? Is she the latest hacker nabbed for disrupting e-commerce?

Actually, the Bonneville Power Administration's Olympia Regional Manager Orion Albro will present Signes a plaque and a letter signed by Secretary of Energy Bill Richardson for being picked as a finalist in the Millennium Power Art contest. Signes' artwork was chosen from among from 4,000 entries from around the nation and from lands overseas as far away as India. One hundred finalists were chosen.

An exhibit of the top 100 works from the Millennium Power Art contest is on the final leg of a nationwide tour. On Earth Day, the exhibit will return to DOE headquarters. The theme of the competition was *Energy Millennium – Honor the Past, Imagine the Future*. The contest

was designed to showcase the talents and creativity of young artists across the nation and to recognize the past and speculate through our children's eyes about how the future will be shaped by energy technologies.

The Bonneville Power Administration is a federal agency that reports to the Secretary of Energy. BPA markets electricity from 29 federal dams and one nonfederal nuclear plant to its wholesale and industrial customers in the Northwest. BPA is a self-funding agency. It receives no tax dollars. The agency uses revenue generated from its electricity sales to cover its costs.
