<u>Categorical Exclusion Applied (from Subpart D, 10 C.F.R. Part 1021):</u> B1.25 Real property transfers for cultural resources protection, habitat preservation, and wildlife management

<u>Description of the Proposed Action:</u> The Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) is proposing to authorize the transfer of conservation easement protection status held by BPA from upland portions of properties previously purchased by BPA for the Coeur d'Alene Tribe to lowland (riparian and wetland) portions of properties owned by the Coeur d'Alene Tribe that currently have no such protection. This action would have the effect of relinquishing conservation easement protection status on upland acreages and acquiring conservation easement protection status on the lowland acreages. All properties are within the Hangman Creek Watershed and owned by the Coeur d'Alene Tribe.

The upland portions of these properties removed from mitigation management and conservation easement protection status total 414.51 acres and are centered 3.3 kilometers east southeast of the communities of DeSmet and Tensed in Benewah County, Idaho. There are an additional 785.34 acres of wetland, riparian, floodplain habitats of these properties currently managed to maximize fish and wildlife mitigation benefits that would maintain their conservation easement protection status and are not affected by this proposal.

The 498.15 acres added to mitigation management and gaining conservation easement protection status are within five noncontiguous parcels along Hangman Creek that are Tribally-owned and downstream of the unaffected acres. BPA would hold the new conservation easement on these lowland parcels to permanently protect, mitigate, and enhance fish and wildlife and their habitat. BPA would also provide stewardship funds toward maintenance, monitoring, and enforcement of the conservation easement to the Coeur d'Alene Tribe.

The changes are proposed to apply conservation easement protections where conservation easement purposes can most effectively be met. The upland parcels are dominated by invasive species to the extent that the only effective control measure has been annual herbicide spraying and agricultural tilling for years with essentially no opportunity for habitat developments for fish and wildlife. The lowland parcels have no such limitation and are well suited to habitat developments and protections for fish and wildlife.

The properties contain habitats that can fulfill the life history needs of the redband trout, a species of interest to the Coeur d'Alene Tribe due to its value as a potential fishery. The Coeur d'Alene Tribe would develop a land management plan to guide the protection and enhancement of habitat and other resources on the property. The plan would be reviewed by BPA for consistency with the conservation easement and the purpose of the acquisition and would be completed by closing. If

BPA proposes to fund any additional activities on the property, further environmental review would be conducted.

Authorizing the proposed conservation easement exchanges fulfills Bonneville's commitments to mitigate for effects of the FCRPS on fish and wildlife in the mainstem Columbia River and its tributaries pursuant to the Pacific Northwest Electric Power Planning and Conservation Act of 1980 (Northwest Power Act) (16 U.S.C. 839 et seq.)].

<u>Findings:</u> In accordance with Section 1021.410(b) of the Department of Energy's (DOE) National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Regulations (57 FR 15144, Apr. 24, 1992, as amended at 61 FR 36221-36243, Jul. 9, 1996; 61 FR 64608, Dec. 6, 1996, 76 FR 63764, Nov. 14, 2011), BPA has determined that the proposed action:

- 1) fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix B of 10 CFR 1021, Subpart D (see attached Environmental Checklist);
- 2) does not present any extraordinary circumstances that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal; and
- 3) has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion.

Based on these determinations, BPA finds that the proposed action is categorically excluded from further NEPA review.

Categorical Exclusion Environmental Checklist

<u>Proposed Action:</u> <u>Hangman Creek Land/Conservation Easement Exchange and Stewardship Funding</u>

Project Site Description

The upland parcels consist of annually farmed and tilled agricultural lands that are heavily infested with invasive annual grasses. The lowland parcels are comprised of important streams, floodplains, habitats, and other important ecosystem attributes including approximately seven kilometers of Hangman Creek, approximately five kilometers of Sheep Creek, and approximately eight kilometers of intermittent drainage bottom. Mature pine open woodland, a rare forest type, occupies approximately 84 acres of the floodplain within the property. Agricultural production was formerly the predominant use of the lowland properties and still covers approximately 405 acres; however, the seasonally saturated soils and occasional flooding has rendered these areas unsuitable for crop production. Restoration has been initiated on approximately 580 acres of the lowland property's floodplain where native grasses are now established on former agricultural lands. Portions of these grassland habitats near drainage bottoms and stream channels have been planted with native deciduous trees and shrubs.
