Proposed Action: Big Summit Prairie Land Acquisition Activities

Location: Crook County, Oregon

<u>Categorical Exclusion Applied (from 10 C.F.R. Part 1021):</u> B1.25 Real property transfers for cultural resources protection, habitat preservation, and wildlife management

<u>Description of the Proposed Action:</u> BPA is proposing to fund the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon (Warm Springs Tribe) to engage in activities supporting the purchase of the Big Summit Prairie, which is a 20,000-acre parcel located 30 miles west of Prineville in Crook County, Oregon. BPA-funded activities would include surveys, property evaluation, contracts and funding match requirements in a public-private partnership to acquire the parcel.

Funding for these actions would support projects that contribute to the restoration of salmon and other native fish populations.

The property consists of meadows and forest and is the headwaters of the Crooked River. The meadows provide abundant camas root and other traditional foods gathered by tribal members. The entities engaged in the partnership would develop a land management plan to guide the protection and enhancement of habitat and other resources on the property. If BPA proposes to fund any additional activities on the property, further environmental review may be conducted.

<u>Findings:</u> In accordance with Section 1021.102 of the Department of Energy's (DOE) National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Regulations (57 FR 15144, Apr. 24, 1992, as amended at 61 FR 36221-36243, Jul. 9, 1996; 61 FR 64608, Dec. 6, 1996; 76 FR 63764, Nov. 14, 2011; 89 FR 34074, April 30, 2024; 90 FR 29676, July 3, 2025 [Interim Final Rule]) and *DOE National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), Implementing Procedures* (dated June 30, 2025), BPA has determined the following:

- 1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix B of 10 CFR 1021;
- 2) The proposal has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion; and
- 3) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposed action that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal (see attached Environmental Evaluation).

Based on these determinations, BPA finds that the proposed action is categorically excluded from further NEPA review.¹

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Project Site Description

Located in the Ochoco Mountains, Big Summit Prairie is a five-by-seven-mile basin at an elevation of 4,500 feet. Privately owned and used for summer cattle grazing, the Prairie is surrounded by federal lands managed by the U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management. Big Summit Prairie, which the U.S. Forest Service has designated a wildflower viewing area, has more than a hundred species of native plants, including the rare Peck's Mariposa lily, a plant endemic to the Ochoco Mountains. The Prairie supports a wide variety and diversity of animal species from birds like sandhill cranes and woodpeckers, butterfly species including the silver-bordered meadow fritillary butterfly and mule deer, pronghorn antelope, and Rocky Mountain elk.
