Introductions & General Announcements

General Updates – Staff Changes etc.

- **NWD** – Liza Wells is the acting Regional Engineering and Business Director. The FCRPS Cultural Resource Program will be in her portfolio due to familiarity with the Columbia River Basin.
- **NWP** – No updates.
- **NWW** – SH updated that he will be transitioning out of PKC. Jennifer Knight will be the new PM for PKC and Royce Johnson will be the PM for Timíimap.
- **NWS** – Jessica (Jessie) Winkler is now the DPM for Seattle District. They will have a new Commander in June/ July.
- **BPA** – Scott Armentrout (EVP of Fish and Wildlife) left in January and there will be some anticipated shuffling in EH. They recently hired Wei-Ning Lee (EH Admin) and Cedric Streater (Transmission Archeologist). MB and AN have been working on a plan to provide additional PM support for the Hungry Horse, Mainstem, and Grand Coulee CGs.
- **Reclamation** – A few archaeologist positions have been sent out for approval; MB is unsure about when the hiring will happen. They are hoping to receive additional help in FCRPS through the



Experienced Worker Program. Francois Sweeney works under that program, and she helps review reports and draft sections. Currently, they have five people in Cultural Resources in their region.

Review of Meeting Minutes

Review and approval of past meeting notes

FY26 December 3-4, 2025 – Approved

Upcoming Meetings/ FY26 CRSC Meeting Schedule

Combined Joint Operating Committee (1/13/26) – The JOC was at BPA’s HQ in Portland. The 3Ps discussed funding challenges and the SWPA Renewal/Amendment. There were questions about the Reclamation rate of execution being low in the last three years. MF said they also discussed challenges with securing adequate funding for the appropriated match for power funds.

SWPA Renewal/ Amendment Meeting (1/27/26) – At the January SWPA Renewal/Amendment meeting, participants discussed what their interests were for the SWPA. Part of the virtual meeting involved splitting people into small break-out groups. This was not successful, and the 3Ps should have provided the contracted facilitators with more guidance. After feedback from participants, the 3Ps decided to have the LFAs take a more active role in leading meetings instead the facilitators. In the future, hosting in-person meetings and avoiding breakout groups will hopefully improve things.

The 3Ps need input on Attachment 5 (undertakings covered by PA) and Attachment 6 (Categories of Routine Activities). DB suggested a future agenda topic for CRSC to start discussing Attachment 5 and 6, to get perspectives from different projects about how they are affected by both.

Group to be prepared to discuss Attachment 5 by June CRSC.

CRSC to discuss Attachment 5 at June CRSC and Attachment 6 in late FY26.

Systemwide Meeting Planning (2/6/26) – Two Systemwide Planning Meetings occurred. As a contingency plan for the possibility of challenges with a continuing resolution or a lapse in appropriated funding leading to a government shutdown at the beginning of FY 2027, the planning committee did not want to set an October or November date. A tentative date is September 1-3rd, 2026, which is the same week as the Fall CRSC Meeting (September 2-3, 2026). The location is still tentative, but they are looking at Clearwater Casino in Lewiston, ID. The group agreed to make the Fall CRSC one day prior to the tentative Systemwide Meeting. They are currently brainstorming panel presentation ideas and finding a keynote speaker.

Panel Presentation Ideas for Systemwide meeting –

- Law Enforcement (similar to CRITPD Officer Allman’s presentation with a representative from DOJ to discuss prosecutors’ perspective)
- Previous rock imagery work done in different CGs
- Internships
- Examples of successful mitigation
- Tribal placenames and publishing (Tribal representatives)

- SHPO panel- how they are meeting individual CG needs, handling site boundaries, etc.

For the Summer CRSC, they were invited by MT SHPO staff to visit a pre-contact archeological site with a hunting blind near Helena, MT on the second day of the meeting.

The Group agreed to a full 2-day CRSC meeting in June (a day and a half for meeting, and half day for site visit).

FCRPS Executive Briefing (8/28/26) – The last Executive Briefing was June 2025. For the upcoming briefing, they will discuss Systemwide renewal and budget.

Systemwide Programmatic Agreement SWPA Requirements

FY25 Annual Report Status (due 3/31/26) – MB received comments, and they have been minor. She will send the final draft to MF and AN as soon as possible.

TCP GIS Data Update – Previously, BPA discussed drafting a TCP feature class. Patrick (BPA) was able to build a feature class and align it with site polygons. He pulled in the data that CMC and MS cleaned up, but there are still many empty attribute fields. The next step is to fill those missing fields and work it out with the counterparts to make sure the data aligns before distributing it internally amongst the LFA FCRPS Cultural Resource Program staff. CMC asked that if PMs have any known contracts for TCP inventory, to let her know and she can send them the updated schema and GIS Specifications for the new TCP Feature Class for them to add it as a contract attachment.

Use of AI within the Program – This topic came up after a deliverable included a disclaimer regarding the use of AI in the report. AN shared the BPA AI policy: you cannot submit classified info, sensitive PII, bulk electronic system info, acquisition info, and if a contractor uses AI, then a human is required to review it. There are some concerns about the use of AI due to the sensitivity of the work they do in the Program. AN suggested that it would be good to have a statement that makes it clear when AI is allowed/ when it isn't for consultants/contractor. 3Ps just asked PMs to keep this in mind as they anticipate it will come up at some point in the future.

MF to investigate USACE AI Policy. AN will send the BPA AI Policy to Group.

Budget

Challenges and high-cost treatments/ FY29-30 BPA IPR – There has been a challenge in the Program regarding high-cost treatments. MF said on the USACE side, they can no longer complete projects like bank stabilization. There is not enough money in the routine budget to do it. They will have to tell PKC CG that they can no longer proceed with the Cottonwood Cove stabilization. The Program has tried to



apply for non-routine expense (NREX) funds and has not been successful in competing for this funding category. Lack of success receiving NREX funds is based on other agency priorities, and NREX funds are not a viable solution moving forward as these funds will be prioritized for infrastructure repair. AN said they will need information from PMs about what could be done if additional funding was available, while also being realistic about what is possible given capacity within the Program.

The Group brainstormed ideas for future funding and mechanisms for future funding. As SWPA Renewal/Amendment discussions proceed, 3Ps asked the PMs to keep these budget discussions in mind. The 3Ps also will consider implications of budget on staffing at the LFAs. After receiving additional information from the PMs for budget justification, the next steps will be 3Ps discussing with JOC and leadership for an increase of funding.

3Ps to make a template for Budget Programming for High Priority Treatments (Due: TBD until they have conversations with JOC).

Determinations of Eligibility-consulting parties initiating DOEs without LFAs initiating consultations – PMs brought up situations where they have found DAHP concurring on eligibility in the evaluation section of the site form when that determination had not yet been consulted on. LFAs don't get notified when this happens in WISAARD. CMC found this on WISAARD for Chief Joseph when entering site forms and LB has sometimes found a similar situation in ICRIS in Idaho. In another instance, ID SHPO changed a HPRCSIT boundary due to an agency preference without notifying the consulting parties. There is also the issue of ID SHPO classifying something as eligible, when it isn't. For WISAARD and OARRA there are options for "evaluated/ unevaluated", but ICRIS does not have that option. PMs said it takes a lot of time to go through all the data to figure out if it has been concurred eligible or not by the SHPOs. DB wanted to get guidance on how they would like to approach these challenges with SHPOs making determinations on FCRPS projects when not initiated by the LFAs. CMC suggested labeling "FCRPS" in the title of projects, and to let SHPOs know that the LFAs are not typically seeking eligibility or something similar for FCRPS projects. There is an upcoming Chief Joseph Technical Meeting (April 2) regarding the district rewrite, CMC and DB will bring it up as an agenda topic with Rob to get his perspective.

Non-Program Participant TCPs – MF brought up that Cowlitz Tribe has been discussing a landscape-scale TCP with NWP, including completing a DOE. The TCP boundary is within the FCRPS APE (WPKK). MF wanted to bring this up in case other Groups are experiencing something similar.

For the White Stone and Lakes Villages Districts, MB received the edits and will send the changes to Brenda soon.

Long-Term Program Goals & Measures

Status of PSPA/HPMPs – **John Day:** Leslie received comments from CTUIR, she will respond to the comments individually. **Lake Roosevelt:** There is one final opportunity to review then it will be sent out for signature by April. **Lower Snake River:** This was moved to FY27. PKC agreed to move forward with this, the Table of Contents will be shared at the Spring Workshop (March 10-13). The goal is to have the draft out by November for technical review and a 60-day formal review in March 2027, to finalize by June 2027. **Bonneville:** PMs do not think this will be completed by FY27. They might add this to a CG meeting agenda to begin prioritizing this. LC added that it comes down to prioritizing how Program



funds are spent, if they dial back on something else the efforts can be refocused on the HPMP (ex: Crates Point or pausing contract actions for DOEs). **Albeni:** There is currently a draft, the FY27 deadline still works.

Non-fed Inventory – AN requested that the PMs provide them with a brief email describing the ways they are trying to meet the non-fed inventory goal. This has not been done for Lake Roosevelt yet, which will require some coordination from the Reclamation side. MB will start brainstorming non-fed inventory ideas as well. CMC said that PKC will begin these conversations for LoMo and Little Goose at their Spring Workshop.

PMs + MB to provide the 3Ps with a brief description of how their Groups are meeting the goal of completing inventory within the APE. Due: June CRSC.

FY26 Performance Indicators

The Reclamation and BPA PI #3 (draft TPF by June 12, 2026) was updated to green. The Reclamation and BPA PI #4 (develop FY27 Annual Work Plan by March 20, 2026) was updated to green.

BPA Participation Grants Status and Upcoming Changes

Compensating Consulting Parties for Meeting Attendance – BPA provides funding for people to get to Cooperating Group, SWPA Renewal, and Systemwide Meetings. 3Ps wanted to make it clear that the grants cover the travel to the SWPA Renewal/Amendment meetings; however, they are not paying for the labor, since they are considered consultation meetings. The labor in CG meetings is sometimes paid for under contract because it is related to contract deliverables requiring tribes to provide technical advice or a similar product and is not consultation.

FACA list update – 3Ps will begin updating the mail list.

3Ps will send the master Mailing List to CRSC. PMs to update the list.

Cooperating Group Round Robin

Libby – Tyler Rounds is a USFS KNF Zone Archeologist who recently joined the CG. Now that there is a USFS representative, the group will be able to continue implementing treatments and monitoring on USFS land again. Kootenai Tribe of Idaho formally requested to join the Libby Group. NWS is moving forward with the Rock Imagery Contract by completing market research which will determine whether it is a SATOC or MATOC. They are moving forward with the Curation Contract with CSKT to move the LD collection from the Salish Kootenai College to the CSKT offices for storage, it should be awarded by April. There is also an HPM Contract in progress with CSKT. For the LJAD, USACE awarded the Cultural Report and plan to award the District Nomination form next.

Albeni Falls – The Kalispel IDIQ is working well, and the Kalispel Tribe are making progress on inventorying sites and updating site forms in high priority areas. To date, they have updated ten site forms (cluster of sites at Riley Creek and West Carey Creek.) The Kalispel will focus on sites in the Morton Slough area as they make their way across the reservoir. The goal is to update the priority site list and have a list of sites that need treatment and have consensus determination for treatment by the November meeting. For some of their ongoing treatments to repair prior stabilizations with plantings,



NRM has been able to work with the Kalispel nursery. The number of plants has doubled from propagations. The Tribes support putting more plants back on to the landform for erosion control. The next contract is the CSKT HPM, which switched from a purchase order type to an IDIQ- it will hopefully be awarded by May. The monitoring for site 10BR0005 contract is up and running, but they still need to figure out a schedule with the CSKT. The CG has an interest in educational and interpretive signage for future TPF ideas. The Tribes requested a caucus to brainstorm and discuss signage ideas amongst themselves. The PMs are also getting caught up on the HPMP and evaluating the recreation areas.

Hungry Horse – The CG’s Q2 Planning Meeting was on February 10th. Kayla returned from leave. The FNF Spotted Bear Ranger District Ranger, Adam Ladell, will continue to join the CG and support the Heritage Program Manager, Ryan Powell. The Group is on track for the FY26 Interim Milestones. One of the TPFs (45FH220) is treating for adverse effects of erosion and recreation. They also produced a draft TPF for the Crossover Campground Travel Management Signs and Barriers. Implementation will occur this spring-summer, along with sign installation of signage at other Logan Creek (FY24 TPF) and Peters Creek (FY25 TPF). The FNF has the capability to construct a kiosk at the campground, so they are developing the FY27 TPF for Interpretive Signage at Crossover Campground and potentially at the Spotted Bear Rangers Station. CSKT has developed interpretive signs, so Kayla is planning to meet with the Culture Committees to discuss. They finalized FY27 Annual Work Plan/5-Year Plan and will work together to draft the BPA-administered SOWs for CSKT and FNF. FNF and CSKT will continue to conduct spring and fall site condition monitoring and CSKT will continue the Ethnobotanical Study and report. The plan is to combine the Elder’s Tour with the Huckleberry Picking Event, reserving a camping area or cabin for Elders to stay.

Lake Roosevelt Mainstem – The CG’s Q2 Business & Planning Meetings were held on January 20-21. Justin Eichelberger confirmed that CTCR received their ARPA Permit (PWR-1979-26-WA-02-LARO). The NPS archaeologist position is still vacant. CTCR hired a full-time Arch I (Mary Elizabeth Alexander) and two Seasonal Arch Techs (Shawnee BearCub and Edith Schluttenhofer). Reclamation is doing drum gate maintenance this year at Grand Coulee Dam that requires a drawdown to 1255ft by March 15th. Chris Runyan (Reclamation Hydraulic Engineer) gave a presentation to Mainstem and Grand Coulee CGs to help them understand reservoir elevation forecasts. The maintenance of drum gates must be completed once in a 3-year period, two times in a 5-year period, and three times in a 7-year period. A minimum of 8 weeks is required to perform the maintenance. Lake Roosevelt must be no higher than 1255ft during the maintenance period. They do not want to do maintenance during a dry year. Chris will continue to coordinate with the CG, along with Reclamation geologist Mike Bjorkland (Mike sends the CG weekly Lake Roosevelt elevation forecasts). For the upcoming site visits they plan to visit Kettle Falls and stabilization sites with Mike Bjorklund and Charlotte Snow (Reclamation Drone Pilot). Whitestone and Lakes Villages District DOEs will be completed in FY26. The CG is on track for the FY26 Interim Milestones. The TPF has been drafted, and the CG finalized the draft FY27 Annual Work Plan/5-Year Plan and will work together to draft the BPA-administered SOWs. 45FE353 was selected for the TPF, with adverse effects to be mitigated for off-site at 45FE00466 and 45FE602. The HHRDD survey of the cemetery (Canine Forensics Foundation) is planned for spring (FY26) and the Engineering Assessment in summer (FY26). Since Phase I/II will take several years, they are considering a FY27 TPF for an Interpretive Media design (possibly at 45OK461). Data recovery underway at 45OK00461, a shell midden site along the dam spillway near Seaton’s Grove. The site is on Tribally owned property where Spirit Ridge Convalescent Center is planned. Excavation is going well, they started in October



(reconnaissance, STPs, and trench) and data recovery is underway (January-April). CG plans to visit the site in May after Q3 meeting.

Lake Roosevelt Spokane Arm – The CG's Q2 Business & Planning Meetings were held on January 28-29th. STIPP submitted their 3-year duration permit to NPS on November 13th and received NPS ARPA permit (26-WA-01 LARO) on February 12th. Fieldwork is now underway. NPS shared that there was recent looting activity at Fort Spokane so they set up trail cam as part of the investigation. Spring site visits are planned April 30th. They are on track to meet FY26 Interim Milestones. The TPF has been drafted, and the CG finalized the draft FY27 Annual Work Plan/5-Year Plan and will work together to draft the BPA-administered SOWs. BPA drafted the final FY26 Interior Lake Docks for signature. The Tribe purchased the docks and will install them prior to the Fishing Derby in March. The Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries and Museums (ATALM) 2026 Conference will be hosted in Spokane, September 21-24th. In addition to the updated Work Plan, a separate spreadsheet was created for TCPs and shared with the STIPP for review and updates. STIPP is planning their data recovery excavation at 45SR18 and another HHRDD survey (ICF).

Chief Joseph – There is an upcoming Technical Meeting in March to focus on the archaeological district update rewrite. SHPO, CTCR and the LFAs will also discuss how to proceed with working on individual DOEs for some TCPs even though they will eventually be covered by the district too. CTCR did an excavation at 45DO245 on a midden that was eroding and they are currently waiting on radiocarbon dates. 45OK1 has an eroding burial feature and CTCR are briefing council to determine next steps. CTCR are working on the first year of a contract to produce a Tribal documentary as mitigation for 45OK11. It will be about the late 1970-1980s excavation done at Chief Joseph prior to the 10-foot pool raise. Crystal from CTCR History Archaeology has conducted around seven interviews so far for this deliverable. The Nespelem land transfer is ongoing, USACE Real Estate and the Tribal Liaison are working on this. DB just issued a task order for Jordan with CTCR History Archaeology to update the site forms for the 12 sites located that fall within the land to be transfer area.

Timiimap – At Dworshak this year they will be surveying 65 acres in the drawdown and merging eight sites. The Group has discussed public education ideas such as making a new arrowhead brochure or ARPA brochure. There is a display at the Dworshak Visitors Center that could use updating, and they are developing an FCRPS Timiimap Group poster. There are currently five ongoing treatments. A current contract in place is 10CW1 Fishing Rock at the Visitors Center that will be relocated to the Tribally managed fish hatchery. There is potential for interpretive signage around the fishing rock. The next step is for the Tribe to do the assessment of where to place the rock. Another contract is in place for NPT to do interviews with Tribal members that use Ahsahka cemetery. Based on feedback from the interviews the participants mentioned: vegetation overgrowth, tombstones and graves collapsing, erosion downslope, and expansion of the cemetery. They will likely need to make addendums for the Ahsahka TPF. Other treatment ideas include an ethnobotanical study, geoarchaeology study, excavation, and working with WSU on an internship Program. The Group has many treatments planned but there is not enough funding and capacity to execute it all.

Payos Kuus Cuukwe – The NWW was about to finish the design for Cottonwood Cove, but due to recent guidance regarding NREX funds they are now unable to fund this anymore. Unfortunately, this stabilization will have to be shelved for now. The Group decided to not continue to utilize a Facilitator and see how things go without one. Something that came out of the PKC Situation Assessment was the



need to clarify how LFAs are consulting with the Group. Because of this, the CG agreed to review and update the Operating Guidelines. They are also going to try adding a Tribal Representative Caucus on the second day of each Workshop (fall and spring) as a standard agenda topic. By doing this, it is allowing the Tribes to have discussions without LFAs present and lets the CG plan ahead of time. The NWW has drafted a performance work statement for survey and evaluation at Twin Sisters by the CTUIR. The YN presented a documentary film about Palus Canyon as a mitigation contract deliverable. The video will be only available to Tribal members. The NPT completed a DOE TCP study for Wawawii area (10-900). The CG’s TPF for this fiscal year will be the Ice Harbor Indian Memorial Monument- it has been vandalized and they are working on adding a gate, camera, and signage. They are also working on renaming the monument; CTUIR chairwoman wrote a formal letter requesting the name change. The next steps are figuring out the process of changing the name. MB added that she is on the U.S. Board on Geographic Names and she can help walk through that process.

Wana Pa Koot Koot – The Elders Tour was rescheduled to April 15th due to the government shutdown in October. Claire Dean will be able to join when they view the pictograph site. Five signs were recently installed in collaboration with WA State Parks at Columbia Hills State Park, which was a huge accomplishment. FY26’s draft TPF for 35WS217 relates to a monument that attracts people to the site where subsequent impacts often happen. There is also ongoing erosion at this site that increases exposure of ancestral remains. There is a contract with Warm Springs to monitor the site monthly. Another treatment is at 35WS221 where human remains are eroding out next to a railroad track, LC has been coordinating with Union Pacific. One of the issues was ground squirrels, feeding off historic walnut trees on USACE land, are tearing up the ground. NWP initially tried to trap them, but it didn’t work. People also trespass in the area due to an unofficial trail, they are also working on signage to keep people on the designated trail. They finished the annual monitoring for 45KL219 and they want to establish a more routine protocol for observing some of the holes developing overtime behind the stabilization structure so they can track it more efficiently. It is currently not a draft TPF but the CG is also working on vacating a public road in Wasco county where there is an active cemetery. There is a process through USACE Real Estate and they plan to install a gate so that only Tribal members have access. They are also developing a plan to do a prescribed burn of vegetation with BIA fire, CTUIR fire, and Wildlife fire near and potentially on 35UM1. This is supported by the City of Umatilla. CTUIR and the city submitted a request to lease and manage the vegetation of that property to USACE in the past, but the process was stalled due to a lack of information from the proponents, it is now back on track. Through multiple tribal contracts 75 sites will be monitored this FY which includes several TCPs.
