Introductions & General Announcements

General updates or staff changes

- **NWD** – Donny Davidson is the acting NWD Programs Director until January, then Lisa Kiefel will take over as another detailee for that position.
- **NWW** – JK is back from maternity leave and will be relocating to the NWW office around spring.
- **NWS** – Both the Deputy Program Manager (Ginny Dierich) and the Chief Office of Counsel (Craig Juckiness) are retiring at the end of the year and beginning of 2026. These are primary leadership positions at the District Level.
- **BPA** – Scott Armentrout (Executive Vice President for Environment, Fish, and Wildlife) will retire January 10, 2026. Dorie Welch (EF&W Deputy VP) will lead Fish EF&W in the interim. Sam Crockett (Transmission) and Shannon McNamara (Fish and Wildlife) were hired as the new Contract Archeologists.

Upcoming Major Meetings

SWPA Renewal Meeting Recap – Overall, the meeting went well. BPA leadership and the NWD Deputy Commander planned to travel the morning of the meeting but were unable to travel due to the weather. John Harriston (BPA Administrator) was able to attend online. Tribal Council/leadership, SHPOs (OR, MT, ID), and LFA leadership were in attendance. Jill Wagner commented that the agency leadership that attended and stayed engaged in conversation left a positive impression on her. She would like to see more decision makers engaged in that way. Triangle Associates facilitated the meeting in person plus one person facilitated the virtual attendees. There was great feedback about keeping the virtual attendees engaged. There was an activity related to the SWPA Assessment to find out what the top five priorities were for the SWPA renewal to help inform future meetings and next steps.

Priorities were: purpose and scope of SWPA, mitigation, PSPAs/HPMPs, recognizing Tribal expertise and clarifying authorities, and signatory dispute resolution, amendments and terminations. Shoshone Bannock, Cowlitz, and Shoshone Paiute showed interest in the SWPA process. JK recalls at the previous CRSO meeting there was a request for funding to assist with the CRSO process (funding for attendance, providing knowledge, etc.). At the Kick-Off, Pat Baird asked why the LFAs were not paying labor hours for consulting party attendance at SWPA Renewal meetings. The LFAs will respond to that question at an upcoming meeting. Triangle will send out a post-meeting synopsis and will share the priority topics matrix with CRSC.

Systemwide Meeting Planning – The first planning meeting is in January. The planning committee will decide the location and date. Something to consider is combining the SWPA Renewal Meeting with the Systemwide Meeting. The last FY25 Systemwide Meeting combined with the TCP Subcommittee Meeting made for a long week, which might be a challenge. Most people requested Spokane for the meeting location since it is central.

Combined JOC Meeting – This meeting was postponed to January 13, 2026. The 3Ps have a 30-minute time slot for presenting. They plan to present SWPA renewal efforts and budget questions received during the last 5 Year Review.

FCRPS Cultural Resources Program Executive Briefing (June/July 2026) – 3Ps will discuss this at their next call.

Systemwide Programmatic Agreement Requirements

FY25 Annual Report due 3/31/26 – The Group reviewed the Annual Report production responsibilities and schedule for completion. They changed the lead for the “routing of transmittal memo” to the 3Ps. AN mentioned that they are working on changing the due date of the Annual Report tabular data and appendices during the SWPA Renewal process, so it does not fall on the holidays.

TCP GIS Data – CMC explained that Transmission Archeologists often ask her about TCPs in BPA’s Transmission APEs since they do not have a TCP layer. She created a draft for a TCP feature class in the FCRPS geodatabase. During this process, it became apparent there were some inconsistencies in how TCPs were being tallied per Project. CMC brings this up because this may reflect significant changes in the Annual Report regarding the TCP breakdown. MF wants to make sure that this database is secure and isn’t shared with others due to the sensitivity of the info. CMC clarified that the TCP feature class of



the geodatabase would not be shared with others at BPA, only FCRPS Archeologists would have access to it. CMC mentioned that there could be potential changes to the number of TCPs in the Chief Joseph APE. The 3Ps noted any significant change in tabular data, especially a decrease in amounts, would need a disclaimer at the bottom of the Annual Report stating the reason for a change in the number of TCPs. It should be a future discussion topic to have with the Tribes on a case-by-case basis in CGs before it is distributed in an Annual Report. It would be good to have these discussions prior to the SW Renewal, but others acknowledged this is not a high priority for PMs right now.

The Group agreed to include brief descriptions in the Annual Report appendices but hold off on changing the data tables.

3rd 5-Year Review of SWPA Performance Wrap-Up – The 5-Year Review letter was sent on November 5, 2025. Many of the concerns have been discussed previously. ACHP was okay with not making changes to the SWPA and addressing their concerns during SWPA Renewal. This wraps up the final 5-Year review.

TPF Consultation – AN explained that there seems to be an inconsistency across the Program in terms of who is consulted with for mitigation to TCPs that have been identified for one Tribe. It could be helpful to find out how other Groups are handling this. PKC has a defined process. DB asked, if LFAs are consulting with the Tribe for the TCP, are they consulted individually or through the whole CG. For PKC, it is flexible and situational. CMC said there are often overlapping TCPs, and their Work Plan states which Tribe the mitigation of the historic property is for. CMC can send the PKC TPF Consultation Process guidance to CRSC. SM asked if SHPO had any concerns about these guidelines, CMC does not remember any comments from SHPO when they created the Consultation Process in 2019. MF and AN added that they should consider data sensitivity in TPFs regarding Tribes' TCPs. This is something to think about for the next SWPA renewal regarding the language about TPF consultation/ TCPs.

Status of PSPAs & Stand-Alone HPMPs

The Dalles – Complete.

Hungry Horse PSPA – Complete.

Chief Joseph HPMP – Complete.

Dworshak HPMP – Complete, received concurrence on Dworshak HPMP.

McNary HPMP – Complete, received ACHP concurrence on McNary.

John Day CRMP – Ongoing, WPKK will review the draft in January. The goal is to send a final letter concurrence by April 1, 2026.

Lake Roosevelt PSPA – DOI Policy left comments and they are waiting on comments from NPS since they are back from the shutdown. The goal is Q2 or Q3 in FY26.

Lower Snake River – Ongoing, there is an agenda topic to discuss this at the December PKC Meeting.

Albeni HPMP – Ongoing, the first draft will be wrapped up by December 2025 and ready for internal LFA review.



Libby PSPA – Complete. For awareness, MF explained that the Kootenai National Forest recently lost their Heritage Program Manager (HPM). The NKF Front Line Supervisor has indicated that USFS staff must be present for monitoring work on KNF managed lands. Because of these challenges, USACE leadership is reviewing the Libby PSPA to define the responsibilities of the agencies who signed the agreement. They will be tracking this issue to make sure that supporting federal agencies who have committed to this Program continue to do so.

Long-Term Program Goals & Measures

Non-fed Inventory – **Payos Kuus Cuukwe**: For the Spring Workshop deliverable the Group will identify parcels for Lower Monumental and Little Goose. They are working on getting an access agreement from Walla Walla County for survey of their lands within McNary. **Albeni**: They will no longer proceed with the postcards since it is inefficient, but they have started brainstorming other methods. Kalispel is assisting in this effort by updating site forms under their IDIQ contract. **Lake Roosevelt**: MB and MS will be discussing strategies soon.

Complete National Register determinations – MF asked how the Group felt about repeating long-term goal #3 for the next five years. LB is unsure if PKC will be able to meet that goal. There was also concern for Timíimap meeting this goal because they are not in favor of creating a district. AN said the intent of this goal is to be able to treat sites that are eligible. Even if they cannot meet those goals, it makes sense to keep it the same. AN and MF asked the PMs to think about this long-term goal in terms of their own CGs. If it is not functioning well in their own Groups, they can discuss this in the future to memorialize and bring it to leadership.

PMs to think about long-term goal #3 in terms of their own Cooperating Groups and discuss at next CRSC.

Complete mitigation/treatment for National Register eligible sites – 3Ps have not heard pushback from any Groups as they shared the change in TPF requirements (reduced to one TPF minimum). When presented, they clarify that this only reduces the minimum requirement meaning they can pursue additional TPFs if interested.

FCRPS Product – LB suggested the [“Why Rock Imagery Matters” CTUIR Video](#) that was previously shared at the Systemwide Meeting. SH asked Teara for permission to post the video on the FCRPS website, and she confirmed it was okay.

FY26 Performance Indicators

For the FY25 PI Table AN updated the Reclamation TPF Interim Milestone under PI #3 to green, MS said they identified 2 sites but could not complete them, making the rest yellow. For the FY26 PI Table, Corps Interim Milestones under PIs #1 and #2, and Reclamation Interim Milestone under PI #3 are green. Interim Milestone under PI #4 for Reclamation is not complete yet.

Day 2: Thursday, December 4, 2025

Non-Consulting Parties as Signatories on TPFs

In some CGs, non-consulting parties will be involved in treatments. In WPKK, WA State Parks wanted to sign a TPF, but they are not a consulting party. WA DAHP is the consulting party who has oversight of the



106 process. In Chief Joseph, WDFW is a landowner and listed as one of the signatories for the TPF for 45DO245, which is on WDFW managed lands. In Chief Joseph, WDFW is a landowner and listed as one of the signatories on two TPFs. Due to the history of recreational impacts that stemmed from both WDFW and O&M of the FCRPS, the TPF became a joint stewardship approach. The CG wanted their signature to commit to managing the area better. The LFA signatures are the only ones that are required, which show they are committed to the work. Sometimes they will send out the TPFs, and concurring parties do not sign it. Others agreed that the more signatures on the TPFs, the better. It is helpful to have a formal “buy-in” for the Program via signature.

Administrative Tasks

FACA list update, Mailing list, FY25 Systemwide meeting notes

The FCRPS mailing list will need to be updated for the Systemwide Meeting. The FY25 Systemwide Meeting notes have been finalized and they will be filed internally. In the past, they compiled slideshows/presentations from the meeting in a booklet and distributed it to participants. They discussed posting the presentations on the FCRPS website but there were concerns about the sensitive information being shared publicly. The Group agreed to not share the FY25 Systemwide Meeting presentations.

Post the Systemwide Meeting Program to FCRPS Website. Remove previous 2023 notes/presentations.

Cooperating Group Round Robin

Libby – In September SKP and CSKT were able to monitor eight of the ten sites within the LJAD. CSKT monitors completed eight days of monitoring at Big Creek Site and reported additional vandalism during multiple monitoring events. SKP is working on the Rock Image MATOC to treat previous vandalism at the site. Before Meghan’s departure (previous KNF HPM) she received SHPO consensus on eight sites at Tobacco Plains as eligible under Criterion A. The CG pivoted and chose a TPF at one of the TCPs in Tobacco Plains. Since Tobacco Plains is on KNF land, there have been challenges without a KNF rep. Due to the nature of their updated eligibility (Criterion A) there is some flexibility on treatments. They have also been working with CSKT to award the Curation contract by spring. They want to start moving the Libby Collection to a new facility at the CSKT offices. The USACE MCX offered to pay for the cost of moving materials, transportation, and labor. Due to the government shutdown, the CSKT Management HPM Assistance contract expired and they were unable to award Option Year 1. SKP is working to re-solicit this contract in time for Q2 CG meeting.

Albeni Falls – The Kalispel IDIQ and the CSKT Site Stewardship IDIQ have been successful and has allowed the CG flexibility in responding to incidents in the Project APE and evolving CG priorities. The affected Tribes would like to continue providing stewardship at 10BR5. For this past recreation season, the CSKT did not identify any adverse effect directly to the site, but they found recreational disturbances in the surrounding area (trash and fire rings left at the site). The Kalispel, under their IDIQ, are working on updating site forms, records, and GIS data. The Kalispel and USACE are working on updating information in the SHPO database ICRIS, since critical data are not in there. PMs are thankful for the TPF requirement being reduced to one, because this Group has many ongoing treatments that have yet to be implemented. They have three previous TPFs that involve signage and FY24 will start discussing the



content on the sign for site 10BR2652 in the February meeting. For a different site and TPF, they are hoping the native plants being grown for the program in the Kalispel's nursery will be mature enough to start planting them at site 10BR20 in the spring. Depending on how the plantings go, the site may need to add more rock in certain spots of the riprap. For the upcoming FY2026 TPF, the CG has interest in doing ethnographic work on the West Carey Creek landscape.

Hungry Horse – Kevin Askan with CSKT is stepping in for Kayla until she returns. Ryan Powell with FNF returned to work after the shutdown. The Spotted Bear Managers Adam Ladell and Nate Beck joined the August meeting. FNF lost 80% of their recreation staff. They discussed 45FH220 activities, observations, and updates. FNF is assisting CSKT with coordinating an Elder's Huckleberry picking event in the fall. Kayla will be coordinating this with their CSKT culture committee. For the FY26 TPF they are developing trail restriction signs for 45FH220. FY27 ideas include: 45FH220 Crossover interpretive panels, updating the Hungry Horse brochure from 2013, and interpretive signs at Spotted Bear Museum.

Mainstem – There will be Drum Gate Maintenance planned during the spring reservoir drawdown (mid-March at 1255 ft. or lower for eight weeks). Christopher Runyan (Reclamation Hydraulic Engineer) will attend the January planning meeting to do a brief presentation on reservoir elevation models. CCT hired two Archeologists for Brenda's team: Edith Schluttenhofer and Mary Elizabeth Alexander. For contracting, there was a time extension mod through December 2026 to use funding for an engineering assessment for Rogers Bar. MB sent the Whitestone and Lakes Villages DOE in October for a 30-day review, they are on track to complete this in FY26. For the FY26 TPF they are working on Phase 1 of the Rogers Bar Community Center. The Skolaskins Church interpretive panels design is in progress. MB invited a Hydrologist/ Engineer/ Geologist to join the CG site visits in April to find out what type of stabilization is feasible at 45ST1163, 45ST45, and 45ST82. The ARPA planning meeting is scheduled for May (after May business meeting).

Spokane Arm – STI is concerned about the low drawdown, the last drum gate maintenance in 2022 exposed burials. The Reclamation BSI Contract needs to be modified since Option-Year 1 of 5 ends in February. BPA will be flexible with contracting tasks and prepare mods as needed. Bobbi Rose is the new Archeology Tech with STIPP. They plan to hire more staff: TCP Specialist, GIS Specialist, and Collections Assistant. The Collections building upgrade is complete. Reclamation visited the Collections building in September for a DOI assessment. STIPP is concerned about the ARPA permit (3-year renewal) approval with NPS staff being affected by the furlough. This permit is needed prior to fieldwork in March. For the Interior Lake Docks FY26 TPF, BPA funded the STI to purchase and install docks for the Fishing Derby in March. Some FY26 TPF ideas: travel management signs, ARPA/ Tribal Code Enforcement signs, interpretive panels at Blue Heron and Coyote Spit. There is strong interest in doing a Lithics Workshop, MB is coordinating with Dan Stuber to plan the training. The Hidden Beach walkway repair (FY25 TPF) needs to be implemented and will require engineering and construction. AN asked STIPP if contracting that work through them is possible. John said if it was designed and engineered by Reclamation and implemented by someone else that could be an option. The Hidden Beach stairs (FY24 TPF) were completed by Reclamation, an extra step is buried under the ramp to anticipate future erosion, and it will be monitored annually.

Chief Joseph – During a field visit this past spring the team discovered a midden feature eroding at 45DO245. CCT has already completed the salvage recovery. The 45DO245 TPF to support that effort is drafted and ready to be finalized. There is interest in doing a 50-Year commemoration of the Chief



Joseph pre-pool raise archaeological project at NWAC, an administrative history, or a coffee table book. LFAs need to figure out where that funding will come from; most of their funding is going to other tasks in the CG. Celia continues to work on resolving some longstanding WISAARD submissions. PMs have also been discussing how they will do DOEs to meet the long-term goals considering that the entire APE is a single district (that remains in progress). There are several active stabilization efforts with TPFs that need to be addressed. At 45OK250 they will add gravel to the reservoir edge and boulders to block vehicle and boat access. OK1 might be an active human remains recovery depending on Tribe's decisions but will be stabilized through hydro-seeding a steep bank. 45OK1 cannot be fully stabilized due to the height and steepness of the bank but will be hydroseeded. The Nespelem land transfer is ongoing and USACE Real Estate is working on it. DB created an HHRD Dogs data analysis heat map that shows the probability of buried human remains based on the HHRD data. The goal was to create something that standardizes the values of the data from multiple contractors. DB will share the map with the CG at their next meeting and discuss next steps.

Timíimap – The Fishing Rock from 10CW1 will be relocated to the Tribally managed fish hatchery. They will work on signage, collections rehab, and more interviews for Magnus Bay. At Evans Creek they plan to do signage and a data recovery plan. John Blong (WSU Professor) will join their next CG meeting to discuss how geoarchaeological research can be tied in with mitigation. They have also discussed updating interpretive materials at the Dworshak Dam Visitors Center- this will be a long-term goal but for now they will add the Arrowhead brochures at boat launches and kiosks. The Standalone Dworshak HPMP is complete, ID SHPO sent their concurrence letter. The USACE also received concurrence on the Dworshak Dam Historic District (Criterion A) and the Dworshak National Fish Hatchery (Criterion A).

Payos Kuus Cuukwe – The PKC Facilitator made the decision to leave the Group. At the next CG meeting, they will discuss options and whether the Group is interested in having another facilitator. The PKC Situational Assessment by Triangle Associates was completed and PKC will need to figure out the next steps. They have nine ongoing treatments. Right now, they are working on the Ice Harbor Indian Memorial and discussing ideas on how to protect the monument from further vandalism. The mitigation-related deliverables they have received from the Tribes have been impressive. NPT identified Wawáawii as a TCP through an expansive 10-900 form. CTUIR provided videos and curriculum as mitigation for rock image site 45BN1753. Kenny Mathias from Wanapum has recently joined PKC. The 45BN202 Contract for a 100% stabilization design was awarded in Q4. The stabilization projects are progressively getting more expensive, and SH has requested NREX funds. LB said that the Plateau Contract for collections management is scheduled for award in FY2026. The MCX helped the Walla Walla District prepare a NAGPRA notice for collections from multiple sites. The USACE is in ongoing discussions with Idaho SHPO regarding NRHP eligibility of Hells Gate State Park and have found the USACE Water Based Recreation history document (Catton 2025) to be a useful reference. The McNary standalone HPMP is finalized and received concurrence.

Wana Pa Koot Koot – The October Elders Tour was postponed due to the government shutdown. It was rescheduled to April. The YN Curation Contract was awarded on the agency side, but it is pending a signature. There will be a total of 16 contract actions for FY26. CRITPD requested a new boat and a larger contract to be able to patrol McNary. The vegetation removal with Youth Corps continues to be successful. There has been slow progress at Crates Points. The NAGPRA Comprehensive Agreement is ongoing, CTUIR has signed but the three other Tribes have not signed it yet. The agreement will be part of the John Day HPMP.
