Dear Landowner/interested party:

The Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) intends to fund the purchase of the 91-acre Chahalpam Phase II property located in Marion County, Oregon by the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde. Western Rivers Conservancy is facilitating transfer of the property to the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde. When the purchase is complete, the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde will own and manage the property for multiple purposes including conservation of fish and wildlife habitat and recreation. BPA will receive a conservation easement to ensure that the habitat values on the property are always protected. BPA is sending this letter to inform nearby residents and other interested parties of this land purchase.

The funding will be provided as part of BPA's ongoing efforts to protect, restore, and enhance habitat for wildlife, Chinook salmon (*Oncorhynchus tshawytscha*) and steelhead (*O. mykiss*). In 2010, BPA and the State of Oregon signed a landmark agreement to jointly protect Willamette Basin fish and wildlife habitat. The Willamette Wildlife Mitigation Agreement dedicates stable funding from electric ratepayers for 15 years to preserve at least 16,000 acres of additional Willamette fish and wildlife habitat. The funding for land acquisitions is part of ongoing efforts to mitigate for the impacts to fish and wildlife from the construction and operation of federal dams in the Willamette River Basin. The State of Oregon agreed to engage stakeholders in a public process for allocating ratepayer funds to the most ecologically beneficial and cost-effective habitat projects. Under the agreement, tribes, agencies and others may apply to use the funds to protect and enhance wetlands, floodplains, grasslands, oak woodlands, riparian areas and other rare habitat, consistent with the Oregon Conservation Strategy and the Northwest Power Council's Fish and Wildlife Program.

Enclosed you will find a map detailing this land transaction. BPA has prepared a memo and environmental checklist documenting that no further environmental review of this funding action is required under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). This documentation, known as a categorical exclusion, was approved on 8/7/14, and is posted on BPA's website at: [http://www.efw.bpa.gov/environmental\\_services/categorical\\_exclusions.aspx](http://www.efw.bpa.gov/environmental_services/categorical_exclusions.aspx).

The Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde will provide long-term stewardship for the land and will develop a management plan to guide the protection and enhancement of habitat on the property. BPA and the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife will review the plan for consistency with the Willamette Wildlife Mitigation Agreement and the purpose of the acquisition. Management actions may include the removal of non-native vegetation and weed

control and enhancement of native habitats. If BPA proposes to fund any additional activities we will conduct additional environmental review under NEPA and other statutes as appropriate.
