RE: BPA Response to FOIA Request to DOE OIG [HQ-2012-01888-F]

Dear Mr. Breimon:

On August 30, 2012, you made a FOIA request to the Department of Energy's Office of Inspector General. You requested "all documents related to the investigation involving my alligations [sic] against Garrett Rehbein."

Among the responsive records in the OIG files were three documents (numbers 4-A, 14, and 15) that originated from BPA. The OIG sent these documents to BPA on January 18, 2013, for processing under FOIA. This letter is BPA's response for those three documents.¹

1. Document 4-A

This is a letter dated July 12, 2011, from BPA to Garrett Rehbein.

Exemption 6 of FOIA protects the disclosure of personnel, medical, and similar files when disclosure would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. This letter is information from a "file" within the meaning of Exemption 6.

To determine whether information must be withheld under Exemption 6, BPA must: (1) identify whether a privacy interest exists in the information; (2) identify whether release would further the public interest by shedding light on the operations and activities of the government; and (3) weigh the identified privacy interests in the information against the public interest in disclosure.

First, there is no question that Mr. Rehbein has a privacy interest in the contents of the letter.

Second, although the allegations prompted a DOE OIG investigation (and ultimately this letter), that does not mean that there is a public interest in the release of the letter. It does not shed light on the agency's performance of its statutory duties, which is the only relevant "public interest"

under FOIA.² Any particular need that you may have for the information is irrelevant under FOIA.³ Finally, there have been no reasons given how the letter would shed light on BPA's activities.⁴

Consequently, since there is no public interest in the disclosure of the letter, there is no need to proceed further and balance the two interests under Exemption 6. The body of the letter will be redacted.⁵

2. Document 14

Document 14 consists of a number of records. The first is an October 14, 2010, transmittal letter from BPA to the DOE OIG. BPA will release this letter (except for the DOE OIG redactions).

Next, there are a number of Confidential Financial Disclosure Reports.⁶ Exemption 3 of FOIA requires the withholding of information that is prohibited from disclosure by another federal statute. 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(3). 5 U.S.C. App'x 4 §107(a)(2), a part of the Ethics in Government Act, prohibits an agency from disclosing these reports. The Act leaves no discretion to an agency as to whether it may reveal the contents of the reports.⁷ Therefore, these reports are withheld in their entirety.⁸

The last record that is part of Document 14 is a position description for "Construction and Maintenance Services Manger," dated 2/1/06. It is a record otherwise available, and will be released.

3. Document 15

Document 15 consists of a transmittal email from BPA to the DOE OIG, as well as an attachment. BPA will release the email except for the DOE OIG redactions.

BPA also redacted the name of the individual who signed the letter, as that individual has a privacy interest in the information, and there is no countervailing public interest in its disclosure.

⁸ BPA also redacted the email asking for clarification of information on the OGE form, as well as the "Outside Activity Request," and "Outside Employment Request." BPA requires all this information in the Financial Disclosure Report process. It is therefore also protected by §107(a)(2). Compare Seife v. NIH, supra at 4 (waiver information taken from Form 450 and put into another document is protected).

The attachment consists of two pages of information regarding purchases made by BPA employees. BPA will release all of the information with the exception of the identity of the employees. For the same reasons discussed above, the employees have a privacy interest in not having their identity connected to specific purchases. The release of that information does not shed light on BPA's activities. The actual purchase information, however, will be released as it shows how BPA funds are spent.

The only exception to the redaction of employee names is for yours, as you made the FOIA request and are entitled to information about yourself.

If you are dissatisfied with this determination, you may appeal within 30 days from the date you received this letter to The Director, Office of Hearings and Appeals, Department of Energy, 1000 Independence Avenue, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20585. The appeal must be in writing and both the envelope and letter must be clearly marked "Freedom of Information Act Appeal."

BPA GRIEVANCE PROCEDURES
FOR NON-BARGAINING UNIT EMPLOYEES

You have the right to file a grievance concerning this action under the procedures set forth in Personnel Letter 771-1 within 14 calendar days of the issuance of a letter of reprimand or a decision regarding a suspension of 14 days or less. Your grievance may be directed to the Labor Relations Officer - NILL-1, who will refer it to the proper deciding official. It must be in writing signed by you, and contain sufficient detail to identify and clarify the basis for your appeal and specify the relief you seek.

You have the right to designate a representative to speak and appear with you or on your behalf in presenting any appeal you initiate. You and your representative will be granted a reasonable amount of official time to present your appeal, if you are otherwise in an active duty status. You and your representative will have freedom from restraint, interference, coercion, discrimination, or reprisal in connection with the presentation of any appeal.

If you need further information regarding your grievance rights, contact Labor Relations.

I. Introduction

The incumbent of this position serves as the Manager for Construction and Maintenance Services, within Transmission Field Services of the Transmission Business Line. This organization has responsibility for providing central electrical and general craft construction and maintenance services for BPA. These activities include field construction of new and upgraded electrical facilities throughout the BPA service area, shop fabrication of electrical panel assemblies and outdoor electrical parts, and emergency restoration support, along with the Regions, for any failed or damaged electrical facilities.

II. Supervisory Controls

The Manager for Construction and Maintenance Services reports directly to the Vice President for Transmission Field Services. The incumbent is frequently in direct working relationships with Bonneville managers and staff; officials of Federal agencies, as functionally required; public and privately-owned utilities; manufacturers and providers of goods and services utilized by Bonneville; professional groups and organizations; and any appropriate regulatory organizations which require decisions and actions to be taken in overall conformance with BPA and Group policy direction. Performance is evaluated in terms of the incumbent's effectiveness in providing cost-effective and timely centralized electrical and general craft services for BPA to assure a safe, reliable, and environmentally acceptable transmission system for delivery of electrical energy to customer utilities and direct service industries.

III. Major Duties

The incumbent provides direction and leadership in the planning, development, and administration of programs, systems, and work processes that are necessary to perform the critical mission and support activities required of the organization. These duties include all activities associated with development and accomplishment of construction projects and associated activities, emergency restoration support, and the maintenance and management of the Ross Complex buildings and grounds.

The Construction and Maintenance Services Manager maintains continuing relationships with managers and employees within Bonneville, Department and Federal officials, manufacturers and service providers, representatives and Federal officials from government agencies on all matters related to the organization's role in support of the Bonneville mission.

The incumbent serves as a member of the Transmission Field Services management team with responsibility for developing, implementing, and evaluating all programs and policies which ensure the time delivery of products and programs in support of Bonneville's strategic business objectives. With respect to the organization managed, the incumbent determines and allocates necessary resources, including staff and funds, and is responsible for their effective and efficient utilization in support of goals, objectives, and functional responsibilities.

Within the Construction and Maintenance Services organization, the incumbent has an inherent responsibility for ensuring team-oriented, effective, harmonious, and productive formal and informal working relationships within his/her organization, between his/her organization and other organizations, and with those positions key to the effective accomplishment of product and service delivery objectives.

As the principle steward for his/her organization, the incumbent creates and maintains a collaborative, team-oriented atmosphere, which is characterized by cost-consciousness, innovation, customer focus, continuous improvement, and competitive orientation.

As Construction and Maintenance Services Manager, the incumbent provides understanding, support, and leadership in administering the Bonneville EEO program for all applicants and employees. To the full extent of his/her authority and responsibility, the incumbent provides and ensures fair and equitable treatment for all employees in personnel policies and practices including recruitment, selection, placement counseling, training, career development promotion, and adverse action.

Introduction

The incumbent of this position serves as the General Craft Services Manager, within General Craft Services, Construction and Maintenance Services, Transmission Field Services.

Transmission Field (TF) Services is responsible for managing field operations and maintenance and construction of BPA's high-voltage electrical transmission system and providing safe, reliable, and cost-effective service to customers. These responsibilities include physical field operations, maintenance, and construction of BPA's electric and non-electric plant facilities in the BPA service area.

The Vice President (VP) for TF Services reports to the Senior Vice President (SVP) of TS and provides advice and support to TF Services managers and employees. The Senior Operations and Maintenance Managers each have oversight for several Districts and are responsible for key policy formulation and decisions for long- and short-range strategic planning for the Transmission System. Through their own staffs and the Districts, the Senior Operations and Maintenance Managers assure that Transmission Field Services achieves the following overall results: safe power system for employees and the public; reliable electric service for customers; and cost effective operation, maintenance, and replacement of the BPA power system.

Construction and Maintenance Services provides central electrical and general craft services for new and upgraded electrical facilities and manages equipment loan pools for Transmission Services. This function is responsible for restoration of failed or damaged facilities in emergencies in concert with the districts. Construction planning leads in work and outage step plans and ensures project preliminary designs meet requirements for constructability. Specialty Services is responsible for maintenance and construction activities on lines and facilities. This includes the bare-hand crew, the transformer response crew (rebuilds transformers), riggers and heavy equipment operators, and the Ross Complex crew (maintains Ross Complex facilities, rehabilitates spare parts and maintains emergency mobile equipment).

General Craft Services is responsible for field and shop painting and welding services, shop carpentry, machining, and sheet metal services including fabrication of switchboard panels and outdoor electrical parts.

Supervisory Controls

The General Craft Services Manager reports directly to the Manager for Construction and Maintenance Services. The incumbent is in direct working relationships with managers and staff at all levels within Bonneville; officials of Federal agencies, as functionally required; public and

Within the General Craft Services organization, the incumbent has an inherent responsibility for ensuring team-oriented, effective, harmonious and productive formal and informal working relationships within his/her organization, between his/her organization and other organizations, and with those positions key to the effective accomplishment of product and service delivery objectives.

Within his/her organization, the incumbent creates and maintains a cost-conscious, market-driven, and results-oriented atmosphere, which is characterized by innovation, customer focus, continuous improvement, and competitive orientation.

As General Craft Services Manager, the incumbent provides understanding, support, and leadership in administering the Bonneville EEO program for all applicants and employees. To the full extent of his/her authority and responsibility, the incumbent provides and ensures fair and equitable treatment for all employees in personnel policies and practices including recruitment, selection, placement counseling, training, career development promotion, and adverse action.
